UNLEASH THE NEXT GENERATION

I first came to Southeast as a middle schooler and was baptized when I was 12. I knew some about Jesus, but my heart had not yet truly experienced Him, and after a year in *High School Ministry*, I drifted away.

My mental health hit an all-time low as my living situation became extremely difficult. Besides losing my relationship with my dad, I was sexually assaulted and bullied, and I turned to addictions that ran in my family, including drugs, alcohol, and smoking. I engaged in self-harm, lost any positive self-image, and believed I had missed my chance at happiness and began living in isolation.

This forced me to reflect: *Did I want to stay trapped in the same cycles that burdened my family for generations, or did I want to break these chains for generations to come?*

I began walking toward healing while turning to God. In March 2024, I returned to Southeast after years away and connected with *College-Age Ministry*. God gifted me a group of sisters in Christ and leaders who discipled me.

That October I connected with middle schoolers, high schoolers, college students, and older adults for a weekly Taco Tuesday night. From that, I received mentorship and joined their MOVE home group, deepening my relationships across generations. I served at *High School Camp* for the first time last year, where I witnessed answered prayers and a generation on fire for the Lord, and soon began serving regularly in *High School Ministry*.

Through all of this, I felt God calling me to be baptized again, but I resisted out of fear. However, this past August 10, I finally committed my full “yes” to Jesus, declaring my trust and dependence on Him.

MOVE has reminded me that God redeems stories and that saying “yes” to Christ brings life-changing transformation and deliverance. MOVE is about boldly stepping into what God has next for us. Open your hands and let God move.

Over two years ago during a Sunday morning service, Southeast prayed over my husband, Justin, and me, and sent us to plant Iron Coast Church in Brunswick, Maine.

Since launching on March 2, 2025 at Brunswick High School's theater, we've been amazed by the work of God unfolding here. At the time of writing, we now average more than 250 people in attendance with over 150 participating in community groups for the very first time in their lives. We've watched 60 people place their faith in Jesus and be baptized, many of them in the frigid (but unforgettable!) Atlantic Ocean.

Among those baptized is Justin's cousin, Devin, who is from Maine and whose transformation demonstrates the power of the Holy Spirit alone. Justin wrote his name on a white chair the Sunday before we launched, part of a prayer initiative for people we hoped would encounter Jesus. After attending his first service on Easter, Devin kept coming back. He was baptized shortly after, declaring Jesus as his Savior and Lord. Today, he shows up at 7:00 am every Sunday to help set up and also tear down later, while regularly inviting co-workers, friends, and family to experience the hope he found.

Since that Sunday two years ago, three additional Southeast members felt God call them to MOVE—not just financially, but physically to Midcoast Maine to join our church planting team.

Other church planters frequently ask us how Southeast Christian Church gives so generously to new plants. Our answer is simple: Southeast isn't afraid to sacrifice and move when God says move—whether through prayer, financial giving, or sending people across the country or world with the one-at-a-time love of Jesus.

At Iron Coast Church, our mission is to *guide explorers to extraordinary lives through Jesus*. This mission is happening because you said YES in faith before you could see by sight. Thank you. No words could describe our deep gratitude and love for Southeast and what you've done for us. We truly believe this is just the beginning of a move of God in Maine and beyond.

SEND 4,000 ON SHORT-TERM MISSION TRIPS

I made the 33-hour trek to Tajikistan last Fall with nine other women. This was my first international mission trip, and to be quite honest, I was extremely untrusting.

While God had clearly made it known He wanted me to go with the timing of the leader approaching me and more, I still had doubts. I was anxious about the needed financial support, flight, not knowing the people, and the country's economy. But God is always good, and He can handle any thought I bring to Him—no matter if true or right—and turn it for my good.

And that He did.

In short, working with EPEK International (our missions partner in Central Asia) and refugees changed my perspective on gratitude in America. It changed my drive to spread the Gospel at home, proclaiming it in a place where deportation isn't at risk. I knew the cliché *"you'll get more out of it than you give,"* but I didn't quite realize how much I would receive from refugees who have very little.

That's the thing—more "stuff" isn't more. While I pray that we loved the people in Tajikistan well, they have an abundance of love within their families because their hearts are full of gratitude.

May we live that way in a life that is full of abundance—loving others more than we value materials. May we value spreading the Gospel because it's the best news anyone could receive... because it has saved their lives...because that's what Jesus did.

We prayed, witnessed, and testified. We heard testimonies, embraced culture, and embraced unity in a place where English was not the first language. We cried, laughed, and danced. We broke down walls and learned. And most importantly, we loved.

I learned that people, no matter where they're from, aren't that different after all. We are one in Jesus Christ, and He died for all nations—united under our Heavenly Father.

EQUIP 150 NEW FAMILIES TO FOSTER AND ADOPT

My wife and I have had the joy of serving with the *Southeast Family Advocacy Ministry*, supporting and encouraging other foster and adoptive parents. Last Spring, a new couple—Jason and Jessica—came to one of our monthly gatherings. They had been fostering for a few years, but had recently moved to Southern Indiana. The meeting was so encouraging that they kept coming back.

After a few months, they got a call for a new placement of a Hispanic teenage girl. Months of waiting quickly turned into a flurry of activity. We encouraged them to make time to connect and let her adjust to her new home and environment.

As Jason and Jessica got to know the girl, they found out that her 15th birthday was coming up and she had never had a birthday party. They told us about wanting to host a quinceañera for her. We offered to help and were able to use some ministry funds to make the party possible. Jason, Jessica, and their foster daughter felt seen and supported through the whole experience.

A few months later, the state decided to move the girl to a new placement. Even though Jason and Jessica knew it was the right decision, they struggled. We met to encourage them and share some of our own experiences.

The journey of fostering can be lonely and isolating at times. It was such a privilege to be a part of Jason, Jessica, and their foster daughter's crew that could walk alongside them through all of the ups and downs.

My husband and I have been praying for our family to grow for several years. When our daughter turned 4, she started asking about having a brother or sister. However, we struggled to get pregnant again and began praying to see what God was wanting to show us. Were we done with one child or was there something else for us? We started to think that maybe it was adoption.

We attended a *Considering Foster Care & Adoption* session at Southeast. It answered a lot of our questions and helped us figure out that domestic adoption was probably the right path for us. After the session, we met with a mom who had struggled with infertility and adopted domestically. She helped us understand the process and encouraged us to continue to seek God's guidance.

One of our biggest hesitations toward domestic adoption was finances. While we felt led to move forward, the cost is significant and we worried if we could afford it. That is where God showed up in incredible ways.

We decided to do a Both Hands fundraiser, where we could serve a widow alongside some of our friends, while those same friends then shared our adoption journey with their network. In just one fundraiser, we raised almost half of the money we needed. God is so incredible!

There is still a lot of road left on our journey and there have already been some bumps in getting matched with a birth mom. But we know that God has us in His hand and He has a child that He is preparing just for us. He has been working in us, and I know He wants to work through us, as well.

As I walked to the main room of the recovery center for a church service, I had no idea what I was doing but knew I had to do something different.

For 30 years I had lived in the toxic cycle of addiction, and I had finally come to the end of myself. As I found a seat, I asked the Lord to meet me...and He did, but in ways I never thought possible.

I'd heard about the church recovery team that helps host weekend services, and I was hopeful. I saw some new faces come into the room, and as the crowd parted, I couldn't believe that I recognized one of the guys... an old high school classmate!

I started toward him, not expecting him to recognize me, but as soon as he saw me, a look of recognition crossed his face. Matt and I had grown up in the same town, he had seen me completely spun out, and now here he was, sharing his recovery story and offering us the opportunity to borrow some of his faith as we considered connecting with Jesus as part of our long-term recovery.

Fast-forward to today...not only have I been sober for over a year, but I have completely weaned myself from the medication to treat my addiction with the help of Jesus and my ever-growing relationship with Him. I have also gradually stepped into some leadership responsibilities, helping facilitate the SE Recovery discipleship classes, as well as help lead weekend worship at the facility where I am now on staff.

God has been so good to meet me at my lowest point and bring me to a place in life I never knew was possible. And now I get to help others experience the true freedom that comes from life with Jesus!

Even in heavy places, like sitting in a courtroom, I have experienced a peace that surpasses all understanding. The generosity of Southeast has provided stability for my family to start over. But even more so, the church has offered my family a place of safety and community for which we will forever be grateful.

I encourage others to get involved with the *Anti-Sex Trafficking Ministry* because the world is failing women, children, and even men who are stuck in a cycle that seems impossible to break. All it takes is one person to help victims see that they are worthy, important, and loved...that they are not damaged beyond repair.

They just need help to break the cycle—and that is the amazing grace of God poured out through the community of the *AST Ministry*.

Through it all, we saw how the Franklin Campus community rallied around us, encouraging us, praying for us, and reminding us that this is exactly what MOVE is about—trusting God enough to take the next step.

provided for us, and our prayer is that we continue to listen to Him.

We are 100% bought in on the MOVE discipleship journey, and we cannot wait to see what God has in store for our family, but even more for our church community here in Franklin as we seek to impact Middle Tennessee for and with Jesus!

Maybe you went to a completely new level in your generosity and are still adjusting your life to it. Maybe you have experienced job loss, job change, or unexpected financial expenses. Persevere to finish strong in this journey that you began. We all stand together, encouraging one another. We know the Lord is faithful. He will provide, and we want to finish strong in our commitment to what He called us to in this season.

INCREASE

Some of you made your MOVE commitment one year ago and it is possible that you have had an increase in faith or finances. It is not that keeping your commitment has been easy, because it has likely required a lot of sacrifice. But you may be sensing the Lord stretching you to take an additional step of faith in your generosity. We challenge those of you to respond to His generosity by increasing your commitment. Generosity is not a one-time event—it is a journey. Consider asking yourself these questions: *What/who am I chasing? Am I still giving in a way that challenges me?* Pray and ask yourself if He is inviting you into another step of faith with an increased commitment.

WHAT IS A ONE-FUND INITIATIVE?

You’ve probably been a part of church campaigns in the past where you were asked to give something “above and beyond” your regular offering—maybe for a building fund or a missions project. At Southeast, we believe that it is all ONE MISSION that we’re on—to unleash the full force of the church to love people one at a time. So, we want to encourage all of us to unleash our generosity toward that mission. Every gift you give to Southeast Christian Church will go toward both our ongoing ministries and the vision God has placed in front of us for the future. We’re treating these priorities as one, and our leadership team has set a single budget that covers the commitments we make together during this MOVE season. It is all part of one vision, moving toward what God is calling us to do.

GIVING DISCIPLESHIP JOURNEY

INITIAL GIVER

An Initial Giver is someone who decides to give for the first time out of response to God's Word. This is someone who decides to give in faith and trusts God and the leaders of the church with the gift. This person will experience the initial joy of putting Jesus' words into action (Matthew 7:24).

CONSISTENT GIVER

A Consistent Giver is someone who decides to give on a consistent basis as an exercise in the discipline of giving. Often, a person who decides to make a recurring online gift will be someone learning the joy of consistency. Of course, with thoughtfulness, non-online givers can be consistent givers as well. A consistent giver experiences the joy of excelling in this grace (2 Corinthians 8:7).

PRIORITY GIVER

A Priority Giver is someone who understands the preeminence of Christ and that He is before all things—that all things were created by Him, for Him, through Him, and to Him. This giver places such a significant priority on their giving that it drives spending and saving habits, as opposed to spending and saving directing what he or she is able to give. A priority giver experiences the freedom of serving "one master" and declaring Jesus is first (Matthew 6:19-24, Colossians 1:15-20).

SURRENDERED GIVER

A Surrendered Giver is someone who recognizes that Christ surrendered His whole self for us in love and desires to surrender his or her whole self to Him in return (Ephesians 5:1-2). This giver would say, "My giving is not just changing my spending and saving, it's also changing me!" He or she will also look at what's not being given and ask, "Is this surrendered as well?" This informs the use of everything they've been blessed and entrusted with—whether it be monetary or an existing resource (i.e., honoring God with your home, etc.).

ETERNAL GIVER

An Eternal Giver is someone who sees the eternal impact of their giving on individuals, not just the immediate programs and ministries it helps. This giver has been captivated by the knowledge that the more he or she is led to "do good...to be generous and willing to share," the more he or she will "...take hold of the life that is truly life" (1 Timothy 6:18-19). This encourages continual growth! The eternal giver will make all decisions (big purchases, savings, giving, relationships, area of service) based on how it will impact eternal matters.

WHAT CAN YOU DO NEXT?

Pray Persistently

Pray that God will move in the hearts of each person at Southeast and that we will hear His invitation to partner with Him.

Commit Fully

Be part of the 100% engagement by fully committing to what God wants to do in you and through you during this season for our church. Allow this to be a journey of discipleship that strengthens your commitment and deepens your faith in God.

Celebrate Loudly

God is going to do amazing things in your life during this season. Enthusiastically share with those around you how He is moving within you.

Give Generously

Ask God to show you what it looks like to give in a way that changes you and take whatever bold steps are required to see it through.

Gospel of Luke

INERTIA.

Newton’s First Law of Motion tells us that an object at rest wants to stay there. It doesn’t want to move. It doesn’t want things to change. It wants to remain exactly where it is. In fact, it’s not going to move unless something forces it to. It takes an extra amount of energy—a jolt of activity—to get things moving.

Even if physics didn’t teach us this truth, life certainly would. It’s tough to get going. Inertia is why we have trouble starting any new project. Inertia is why we hit the snooze button every morning. Inertia is why we can never seem to get things around us to change no matter how much we say we want them to be different. It’s easier to stay where we are. It’s easier to stay who we are. We’re not going to move unless something—or someone—gives us a reason to move.

In the Gospel of Luke, Jesus encountered a lot of people who were stuck. Their circumstances had created a rut they couldn’t get themselves out of. For some, their collision with Jesus was enough to jolt them into action. They were finally able to move out and move on. Others found themselves unable, perhaps even unwilling, to get going. While their stories were all different, they are the stories we still live today. Their inertia, like ours, had a name...

- **APATHY**
 - **FEAR**
 - **PRIDE**
- **SELF-SUFFICIENCY**
 - **WORRY**
 - **COMPARISON**

These aren’t just feelings; they’re forces. They’re barriers that keep us stuck. It’s hard to move forward when you’re afraid of the future. It’s hard to be all-in when you’re convinced you can do life on your own. It’s hard to stay focused on Jesus when you’re constantly comparing yourself to everyone else. But Jesus doesn’t just point out the barriers—He calls us beyond them. He reminds us that He’s in the boat with us. He shows us that our lives are meant for more than playing it safe, standing still, or settling for less.

That’s why Southeast is calling every person to MOVE—to worship fully, connect deeply in groups, serve sacrificially, give generously, and go boldly on mission. Once we catch a glimpse of where Jesus wants to lead us, inertia won’t stand a chance.

IT’S TIME TO MOVE.

HOW TO USE THIS GUIDE

This guide is designed to help your group walk through six different barriers to being 100% engaged with Jesus and His church, the primary goal through our MOVE initiative. Each week focuses on one barrier and how Jesus calls us to move past it so we can live fully engaged in Him and in the mission of Southeast.

STRUCTURE OF EACH WEEK

- **Short Video**
Each session begins with a brief video. Watch this together before starting the discussion.
- **Personal Reading**
The written teaching for each week is for group members to read before they come. This helps maximize your time together for discussion and application.
- **Personal Reflection Questions**
Use these questions to think about what these barriers look like in your own life and how Jesus might be moving you beyond them.
- **Group Questions**
Each week offers more questions than most groups will need. Leaders are encouraged to choose the questions that best fit their group’s dynamic and season. The categories are:
 - **Getting Started**
Icebreaker-type questions to get everyone talking and open up the conversation.
 - **Digging In**
Questions that explore the week’s Scripture and teaching more deeply.
 - **Opening Up**
Vulnerability-driven questions that invite personal reflection and sharing.
- **Next Steps**
Each week connects to what it means to be fully engaged at Southeast (worship, groups, serving, generosity, mission).

TIPS FOR LEADERS

- **Pray First**
Start each gathering by asking God to open hearts and guide your conversation.
- **Choose Wisely**
Don't feel pressure to cover every question. Think of this guide as a toolbox—use what serves your group best.
- **Cultivate a Safe Environment**
Encourage honesty and respect. Remind your group that what is shared stays in the group.
- **Balance the Conversation**
Make sure everyone has a chance to contribute. Step in if one or two people dominate.
- **Keep It Practical**
Always ask, “How can I live this out this week?” Faith grows best when it moves into action.

TIPS FOR GROUP MEMBERS

- **Come Prepared**
Read the week's teaching before your group meets so you're ready to dive in.
- **Engage the Video**
Watch closely and listen for what stands out—you may want to share that in discussion.
- **Be Honest**
The best growth happens when we're real about where we struggle.
- **Listen Well**
Give others the space to share. Don't just wait for your turn to talk.
- **Respect Privacy**
What's shared in the group stays in the group. Guard the privacy of others.
- **Take a Step**
Each week, consider how you can put what you've learned into practice in your daily life.



THE GOAL

The goal of this guide isn't merely discussion or connection, but to push us toward transformation. As your group works through the six barriers of apathy, fear, pride, self-sufficiency, worry, and comparison, the hope is that everyone will see where these struggles show up in their lives and discover how to move toward being 100% engaged with Jesus and His church.

WEEK 1

APATHY

Can you imagine what it must have been like to watch Jesus grow up? The people in Jesus’ hometown of Nazareth had a front-row seat! They might not have realized it at the time, but they were witnesses of some pretty incredible stuff. They saw Jesus lose His first tooth. They watched Him play games with His friends in the street. They had to deal with the one teenager in history who really did know it all!

If the citizens of Nazareth were impressed by Jesus as a child, then they must have lost some of that wonder once He grew up. The first time Jesus preached in His hometown synagogue, the people seemed unmoved by His message. Wasn’t this Joseph and Mary’s son? The carpenter’s boy? What right did He have to speak like this? Their familiarity bred apathy in their hearts. The people of Nazareth missed the miracle standing in front of them because He seemed too familiar. The same danger still exists today. Like those gathered in the synagogue that day, we can become apathetic toward Jesus. We can become so used to Jesus’ daily provision and presence in our lives that we respond more with thoughtlessness than thanksgiving. We can take Jesus for granted instead of responding with the gratitude He deserves.

Our familiarity with who Jesus is and what He’s done for us can numb us to what He wants to do right now. Apathy inhibits movement. It makes us unwilling—or unable—to go where Jesus wants us to go. When we lose the wonder of “God with us,” we lose the desire to move with God. But Jesus is still doing miraculous things. He is still worthy of our praise. He’s still moving in grace and in power. And through MOVE, He is inviting us to worship fully, connect in groups, serve sacrificially, give generously, and go boldly on mission. The only question is: Will we move with Him?

PERSONAL REFLECTION QUESTIONS

Read Luke 4:14-30. What happened when Jesus preached to the people in Nazareth? How did their apathy ultimately turn to hostility?

How do I respond to Jesus with apathy? When was the last time I was truly in awe of something He has done for me?

Make a list of the ways Jesus has blessed you today. Do you take any of these things for granted? How can you take time each day to express gratitude?

What are some of the ways our culture makes us focus on what we don’t have? In what ways does gratitude force us to focus on the things we do have? How does generosity show our gratitude for what we’ve been given?

What would it look like for you to move with Jesus today? Is there a step of gratitude you’ve been hesitating to take?

2. Read Luke 4:28-30. Why do you think the people went from passive apathy to outright anger? What does that progression reveal about the danger of indifference?
3. In what ways can familiarity with Jesus—or with church—cause us to lose our sense of awe?
4. The goal of our MOVE initiative challenges each of us to be *100% engaged*. What does that phrase mean to you personally?
5. Think about the areas of ministry at Southeast (worship, serving, groups, outreach, generosity). Where do you find it easiest to stay engaged? Where is apathy most tempting?
6. What are some warning signs in your own life that you may be slipping into apathy toward your faith or your church involvement?
7. Check out Jesus' warning in Revelation 2:1-5. How does Scripture describe the danger of spiritual apathy or "forgetting your first love?"
8. What helps you personally to move from thoughtlessness to gratitude in your walk with Jesus?

Opening Up

1. Where do you see apathy showing up most in your walk with Jesus right now—and how does it impact your connection to our church?
2. Can you share a time when apathy caused you to step back or “check out” from church or faith, and what helped you to re-engage?
3. How do disappointment, unanswered prayers, or weariness feed apathy in me?
4. If being 100% engaged at Southeast means pushing through apathy, what is one step you sense God might be inviting you to take right now?

WEEK 2

FEAR

Fear is a universal experience. Though no one knows the exact number, most experts say that there are over 500 catalogued phobias. If something exists, there's probably someone who's afraid of it. Some fears are fairly common. It's estimated that up to 40% of Americans have aerophobia, the fear of flying. Anyone who's ever explored a dusty attic or crawlspace knows how suddenly arachnophobia (the fear of spiders) can set in. Ophidiophobia may sound complicated, but it's actually one of the most elementary fears of all: the fear of snakes. Regardless of your exact phobia, we all know what it's like to be afraid.

In Luke 8, Jesus' disciples faced a situation that would have made naviphobics out of just about anyone (that's the fear of boats, by the way). As they sailed across the Sea of Galilee, a violent storm overtook them. With water beginning to fill their boat, death seemed imminent. The only thing rising faster than the water level was their fear. Struggling to save themselves, they turned to Jesus for help. Imagine their surprise when they found Him asleep! What threatened to sink them didn't even shake Him! Jesus ended the storm with a mere word. The lightning and thunder ceased. The waves calmed. All it took was the presence and power of Jesus.

What's true of literal storms is also true for metaphorical ones. The storms of life can pour fear into our hearts—uncertainty, bitterness, doubt. The waves can start to look like walls, boxing us in and keeping us stuck. They make us forget that Jesus is in the boat with us. He isn't panicked, but present. Fear wants to paralyze us, but Jesus calls us to move forward.

At Southeast, MOVE is about stepping out in faith—worshiping, connecting, serving, giving, and going—even when the waves feel overwhelming. We overcome fear not by denying it, but by trusting the One who is greater than the storm. The question is, will we let fear keep us stuck, or will we move with Him?

PERSONAL REFLECTION QUESTIONS

Read Luke 8:22-25. What happened when the disciples encountered a storm on the Sea of Galilee? What do we learn in this story about who Jesus is and what He can do?

In what ways are fear and faith opposites? What are some of the fears that keep you from stepping out in faith? What would it look like for you to give those fears over to Jesus?

What storms are you currently facing? How would it change your perspective to know that Jesus is in it with you?

The storms that threaten us will either grow our faith or our fear. What are some practices that can help you grow your faith in the middle of the storms?

What would it look like for you to move with Jesus today? Is there a step of boldness you've been hesitating to take?

4. Where in your life right now do you need to be reminded that Jesus is with you in the boat?
5. How can this group pray for you to face your fears with faith?

WEEK 3

PRIDE

Anyone who's ever read the Old Testament knows how overwhelming it can be. It's almost impossible to keep up with the 613 laws it contains! In addition to laws like the Ten Commandments, you have laws about fabrics, laws about sacrifices, laws about foods, and laws about worship. The sheer number of commands makes one thing clear—there's no way we can do this on our own! Cataloguing the laws would be hard enough. Keeping them is another matter entirely. The more we read the Law, the more humble we should be.

Unfortunately, the Pharisees in Jesus' day saw the Law more as a cause for pride. After all, they had kept all of God's commands (well, at least on their scorecard). In fact, their traditions and rituals ensured their absolute purity. It's estimated that the Pharisees added over 1,500 codes and qualifications to the Law. But, in focusing on the quantity of the laws, they had missed out on the qualities those laws were trying to cultivate. They offered the right sacrifices, but they did it with the wrong kind of heart.

Luke 11 tells us of a time when Jesus confronted pride directly. What they practiced wasn't piety; it was posturing. The things they thought were drawing them closer to God were actually pushing them away from Him. That's because pride divides. It separates us from one another as we try to make ourselves look better, and it separates us from God by convincing us we don't need Him. If we think we have everything, why would we reach for Him? At Southeast, MOVE calls us to humility—to worship with dependence, to serve with open hands, to give with surrender, and to go with grace. When we let go of pride, we create space for God to move in us and through us. The real question is, are we willing to move aside so He can move in?

PERSONAL REFLECTION QUESTIONS

Read Luke 11:37-54. How did Jesus confront the Pharisees in this passage? What warning can we take away from His strong words here?

What are some of the things in life you are proud of? How might those things give you an opportunity to practice humility?

Have you ever known anyone who was truly humble? What characteristics stick out when you think of that person?

How does recognizing our need for a Savior create humility within us? In what ways does our need for grace help us practice humility?

Read Philippians 2:3-11. How does Jesus serve as the ultimate example of humility? What would it look like for you to live out His example in your day-to-day life?

What would it look like for you to move with Jesus today? Is there a step of humility you've been hesitating to take?

WEEK 4

SELF-SUFFICIENCY

“I can do it myself!”

If you’ve ever argued with a 3-year-old, chances are that you’ve heard those words before. From the moment we can speak, we want the world to know we’re capable. We can tackle any problem, face any obstacle, and do it on our own. We want to be self-sufficient. We want to make our own way in this world. It’s one of the core values of American culture. We don’t want to ask for help. We don’t need anyone to come and save us. We want to feel like we can do it for ourselves.

When the “Rich Young Ruler” approached Jesus in Luke 18, he wanted that same assurance. “Good Teacher, what should I do to inherit eternal life?” He assumed that he could make it his own way. He didn’t need any help. He could pull himself up into the Kingdom. Jesus saw through his self-assured facade. Recognizing the man’s wealth, Jesus told the man to do the one thing He knew he couldn’t do: **“Sell all your possessions and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven. Then come, follow me” (Luke 18:22 NLT).** The young man was willing to do anything it took, except for the one thing Jesus asked.

Jesus’ request wasn’t about the cash; it was about control. For the Rich Young Ruler, his wealth kept his hands firmly on the steering wheel of his life. He controlled his future. He controlled his destiny. What he didn’t realize was that the more you carry on your own, the harder it is to move. We can’t trust in Jesus and trust in ourselves at the same time—it doesn’t work like that. You can’t earn your way into the Kingdom; you can only receive it as a gift. The life Jesus offers begins not with achievement, but with surrender. At Southeast, MOVE reminds us that surrender looks like worshiping God above everything else, serving instead of striving, and giving with open hands. The more we let go, the more we let Him move us to where He wants us to be.

PERSONAL REFLECTION QUESTIONS

Read Luke 18:18-30. How did the Rich Young Ruler respond to Jesus’ words? Why did this surprise Jesus’ disciples?

Why is it so hard for the self-reliant to enter the Kingdom? How does grace require us to rely on Jesus over ourselves?

What are some areas in your spiritual life where you are tempted to be self-sufficient? Where do you think this desire to be self-reliant comes from? How do you think Jesus could confront your sources of confidence?

How was the Rich Young Ruler seeking validation over transformation? How are you guilty of the same thing?

What would it look like for you to move with Jesus today? Is there a step of confidence in Christ you’ve been hesitating to take?

WEEK 5

WORRY

We live in both a time of unmatched wealth and unmatched worry. Our phones give us nearly unlimited access to all the knowledge in the world. They also create comparison traps on social media. Our hospitals can provide us with the tools to fight off almost every sickness. Unfortunately, fighting off the medical bills isn't always as easy as stopping the disease. Our stores make it possible for us to buy food from all over the world, no matter the season. They also fuel a hunger for debt and dissatisfaction. The very things that make this the best of times have also made it the most anxious of times.

Luke 9 tells us the story of three would-be disciples who approached Jesus. Though they were wanting to follow Him, they were also worried about what it might cost them. The first was concerned with the accommodations. If he followed Jesus, where would he sleep? The second was concerned with his relationships. If he followed Jesus, could he stay in touch with his friends and family? The third was concerned about the commitment. What if he decided to follow Jesus and then wanted to turn back?

Their anxieties, in many ways, mirror our own. We don't want Jesus messing with our comfort. We don't want Him poking into our relationships. We'll give it all to Him—provided He leaves a little for us. But Jesus doesn't ask for conditional surrender; He asks for complete trust. He calls us to release even the things we're most anxious about. Because the things we hold onto can hold us back from where He wants to lead us. At Southeast, MOVE calls us to live with open hands—to worship without distraction, to step into groups and relationships without fear, to give and serve without reservation. Following Jesus isn't about the anxiety of what you'll lose, but the joy of what you'll find when you fully move with Him.

PERSONAL REFLECTION QUESTIONS

Read Luke 9:57-62. What were the excuses presented by each of these would-be disciples? How do we see these same excuses today?

Why do you think we struggle so much with worry and anxiety? How does having more give us more to be worried about?

What are some of the things you worry about on a daily basis? How do our worries reveal the things our hearts are really focused on?

Which of the three would-be disciples in Luke 9 do you most relate to? Have you ever been hesitant to follow Jesus because of what it might cost? What might it look like to overcome that worry?

What would it look like for you to move with Jesus today? Is there a step of joy in Christ you've been hesitating to take?

WEEK 6

COMPARISON

There's something in us that likes to look down on others. We "Facebook stalk" people so that we can check out everything from their vocation to their vacations to see how we measure up against them. We use social media to ridicule and gang up on those who have different opinions than the ones we hold. We may not be convinced we're a good person, but our comparison games help us recognize that we're not a bad person. At least we're not as bad as *those* people. We don't need to be in first place; we just like the assurance that we're not in last place.

As Jesus dined in the house of Simon the Pharisee (Luke 7), an amazing thing happened. A sinful woman from the town decided to crash the party. She ran up to the table where Jesus was sitting and began weeping at His feet. When the tears proved they weren't enough to wash His feet, she took out an expensive bottle of perfume and began to anoint them. As the aroma of the perfume began to fill the room, so did the scent of scandal. Didn't Jesus realize who this woman was? Didn't He know what kind of woman she was? To Simon and the others, this woman's posture on the floor represented her worth. She was nothing. She was beneath them.

No one would dare to vocalize thoughts like these. But the truth is, we've all had them. We look down on people. We elevate ourselves at the expense of others. Jesus confronts us the same way He confronted the crowd in Simon's house. He reminded them that sin has brought us all low. It has made all of us debtors. It's left every one of us on the floor. Staring at those we think are beneath us only keeps us from pointing them to the One who lifts us all up. The barrier of comparison falls when we remember that we've all been rescued—and none of us did the rescuing. That's why MOVE calls us to live differently: to worship fully without pride, to connect deeply in groups without judgment, to serve sacrificially with humility, and to give generously so that others can experience the same grace we've been given.

PERSONAL REFLECTION QUESTIONS

Read Luke 7:36-50. How did the crowd react to the sinful woman? How do we have the same reaction to those we believe are beneath us today?

Why do you think we feel the need to compare ourselves to other people? Why can't we just be content with who we are and who Jesus has created us to be?

Are you more likely to view people the way the Pharisees did or the way Jesus did? How can you begin to see people more through Jesus' eyes?

In what ways can comparison keep us from moving with Jesus? How does comparing ourselves to others prevent us from being 100% engaged in the mission?

What would it look like for you to move with Jesus today? Is there a step of contentment you've been hesitating to take?
